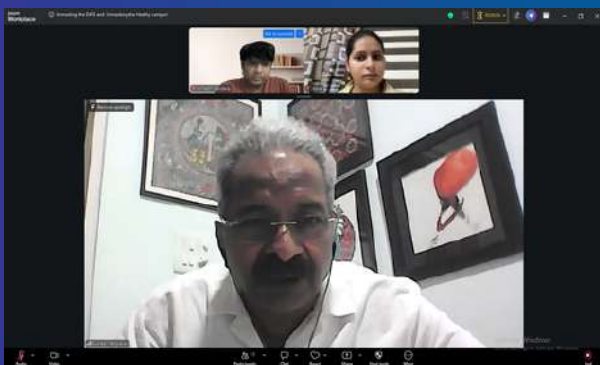

NAPSWI updates

NAPSWI STUDENT AMBASSADORS CHAMPION "HEALTHY CAMPUS" INITIATIVE



An interactive session on "Unmasking the Healthy Campus" brought together NAFSI (NADA India Foundation) Student Ambassadors to discuss issues related to drug, alcohol, and tobacco use on college campuses and explore ways to foster healthier educational environments.

The session commenced with welcome remarks by Srinath, who introduced the theme and encouraged participants to reflect on the meaning of "unmasking" in campus life. Participants including Pinki, Angel Sona, Sharon, and others shared their perspectives on healthy and unhealthy campus environments.

Ishika Rastogi highlighted the importance of self-disclosure and trust through a personal experience, emphasizing how seeking support can help individuals navigate difficult situations. Sharon presented insights on how substance use can overshadow the positive identity and heritage of educational institutions.

Facilitating the discussion, Mr. Suneel Vatsyayan emphasized the significance of supportive peer networks and a strength-based approach to campus well-being. Participants discussed how masking behaviors can prevent individuals from seeking help and how campuses can become more inclusive, participatory, and supportive spaces.

Prakalya shared valuable observations from psychiatric social work training, noting that substance use is often linked to deeper personal and social challenges. Om reflected on the complexities of creating healthy campuses and stressed the importance of collective responsibility and engagement. The session concluded with an enriching exchange of experiences, reinforcing the role of youth leadership and peer support in promoting healthier campus communities.

NAPSWI LEGAL LITERACY WEBINAR ON PWDVA SUCCESSFULLY CONDUCTED



The National Association of Professional Social Workers in India (NAPSWI) successfully conducted the sixth session of its Legal Literacy Webinar Series on "Protection of Women from Domestic Violence Act, 2005 (PWDVA)" on 17 May 2026. The session was delivered by Dr. Trupti Jhaveri Panchal, Assistant Professor, Women-Centred Social Work, School of Social Work, Tata Institute of Social Sciences (TISS), Mumbai Campus.

The webinar received an excellent response, with more than 155 participants joining from various states across India. Participants included social work educators, practitioners, students, researchers, counsellors, and development professionals.

Dr. Panchal provided a comprehensive understanding of the PWDVA, explaining its objectives, major provisions, rights of aggrieved women, and the roles of protection officers, service providers, and social workers. She also highlighted practical challenges faced by survivors and discussed intervention strategies from a social work perspective.

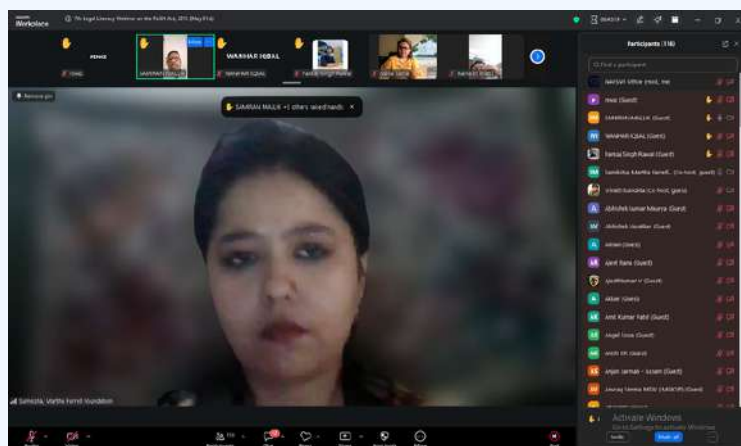
The interactive session generated significant engagement, with participants raising several questions and queries related to the implementation of the Act, legal remedies available to survivors, the role of social workers in domestic violence cases, documentation procedures, ethical concerns, and coordination with legal and support systems. The webinar concluded with an enriching discussion and positive feedback from participants, reaffirming NPSWI's commitment to promoting legal literacy and strengthening professional social work practice in India.

Continuing the momentum of the year-long Legal Literacy Workshop Series aimed at empowering social work practitioners, NPSWI successfully conducted its seventh virtual session on Sunday, May 31, 2026. This vital installment focused on navigating the critical nuances of the Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (PoSH) Act, 2013.

The session was expertly led by Ms. Samiksha Jha, Associate Director at the Martha Farrell Foundation. As a recognized feminist development practitioner and gender justice expert, Ms. Jha provided invaluable insights drawn from her extensive experience in labor rights and Diversity, Equity & Inclusion (DEI). She emphasized intersectional and survivor-centric approaches to building safe workspaces and shared practical knowledge regarding Internal Committees and community mobilization.

The webinar was highly engaging and well-received, with over 150+ participants joining the platform. This strong turnout underscores the community's dedication to enhancing legal literacy, upholding ethical standards, and championing workplace safety across India.

Supreme Court issues notice on plea against child labour in spas

The Supreme Court on Monday sought responses from the Centre, child rights body NCPCR, and the NHRC on a PIL seeking an absolute ban on the employment of children and adolescents in orchestras, dance troupes, massage parlours, and spas. A bench comprising Chief Justice Surya Kant and Justices Joymalya Bagchi and Vipul M Pancholi took note of the submissions of senior advocate H S Phoolka, appearing for child rights collective 'Just Rights for Children Alliance' (JRCA), and issued the notices to Union ministries of labour and law and justice. The Samsar Model of Social Work Practice

Mrs. Vimala Thangavelu is the first Indian social work educator to develop a model of Social Case Work Practice relevant to the Indian socio-cultural context and value systems. The samsar model is developed from the ecological perspective, and it is a welcome departure from the medical-disease model. "The unit of attention or focus of attention in the samsar model includes those people and situations that are present in the client's family's transactional field and the focus is on the present and how to progress into the future". The helping process in the samsar model has four stages. The initial stage comprises of preparation for seeing a family, engagement or the process of exploration, and contacting or process of deciding on what problems to work on by the family and the worker. The points of entry to help form the second stage. The methods of intervention constitute the third stage. The emphasis at this stage is on task achievement based on the concept of action outlined by the theory of Karma. Ending the contract and evaluation comprise the fourth stage.

The general principles and concepts of the samsar model are : principles of familialisation, family determination, family confidentiality, neighbourhood and community confidentiality, verbal and non-verbal communication; non-judgemental attitude and self-awareness ; concept of Yagna (Sacrifice), Karma Yoga, and actions performed with a sense of duty.

Mrs. Thangavelu teaches social work in the USA. She graduated from the University of Madras and obtained her doctorate in social work from the Columbia University. Before going to the USA she taught at the College of Social Work, Roshni Nilaya, Mangalore and at the Madras School of Social Work. Her book, 'Samsar Model of Social Work Practice', is available for sale with the Preeti Publications, Mangalore 575 002.
